If you are writing to the tiredest farmer in Koosharem, what do you do to keep him awake? No attention span, no interest or anything. He's just a tired, dead farmer. If he's the one you have to write for, you're certainly going to lose your other audience in a hurry. I never obeyed that counsel."]

"Archaeology and Our Religion" was originally intended to be included in the "I Believe" series in the Instructor but was not included because of its controversial nature, i.e., the debunking of archaeology, geology and other sciences for the lack of honest searching for the truth. The second letter is a diatribe for the "pursuit of truth" no matter who gets hurt.]
